Bring 'em home!

- UK on a mission to bring home stranded Brits
- 'Biggest peacetime repatriation' launched

THE SUDDEN collapse of Monarch Airlines this week has brought holiday misery for hundreds of thousands and prompted a government mission to bring back Britons stranded overseas.

As the British Weekly went to press more than a fifth of Monarch passengers who were abroad when the airline collapsed have returned to the UK since what has been described as 'Britain's biggest peacetime repatriation' started on Monday.

The Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) said that so far 119 flights had brought back 23,321 people, with another 11,091 expected to return on Wednesday.

The remaining 87,431 Monarch Airlines customers are expected to be back in the UK by October 15, at no extra cost.

The CAA and the Government are working together to deliver the programme, which was prompted by the airline going into administration and cancelling the flights and holidays of 860,000 people.

On Tuesday it was

revealed that the vast majority of Monarch customers will not receive an automatic refund, with administrators KPMG estimating that just 10%-15% of those affected have bookings protected by the Air Travel Organiser's Licence (Atol).

Flights returning 110,000 passengers from overseas after Monarch's collapse will cost about £60m, according to the UK airline regulator.

'depressed prices'

More than 11,800 were flown home to the UK during Monday on 61 flights, the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) said.

Monarch Airlines ceased trading early on Monday, leading to nearly 1,900 job losses and the cancellation of all its flights and holidays.

The collapse of the 50-year-old company is the largest ever for a UK airline.

The government is set to

pick up the tab for flying Monarch passengers home, but is talking to credit card companies about sharing some of the cost.

More than half the Monarch passengers due be flown back this week are either in Spain or the Spanish islands, it has emerged.

The airline was reportedly looking at potential partners before the collapse, which was prompted, sources say, but by uncertainty surrounding the future regulation of the UK aviation industry after the Brexit vote. Terror attacks in Tunisia and Egypt, increased competition and the weak pound have been blamed for Monarch's demise. The airline reported a loss of £291m for the year to October 2016, compared with a profit of £27m for the previous 12 months, after revenues slumped. Monarch's owner, Greybull Capital,

had been trying to sell part or all of its short-haul operation so it could focus on more profitable long-haul routes, and said it was "very sorry" it had not been able to turn around its fortunes.

Blair Nimmo, from administrator KPMG, said its collapse was a result of "depressed prices" in the short-haul travel market, alongside increased fuel costs and handling charges as a result of a weak pound.

The UK's fifth biggest airline was placed in administration at 04:00

BST on Monday - a time when the airline had no planes in the air.

Passengers were then sent text messages informing them flights had been cancelled, but some customers were already at airports.

Alan Jee was just one of thousands who were due to jet out this week and are now left uncertain if they will be reimbursed for a significant cash outlay. Mr. Jee was due to get married in Gran Canaria on Saturday and arrived at Gatwick airport with 30 members of his family.

"I have spent £12,000 on my wedding and now I can't even go and get married," he said. "I am gutted, absolutely gutted, and my missus is in tears, an emotional wreck."

Transport Secretary Chris Grayling described it as the "biggest ever peacetime repatriation".

Easyjet said it would be "really pleased" to hire former Monarch employees, saying it had 400 cabin crew vacancies at Gatwick Airport and 100 at Luton, as well as job openings for pilots and head office staff.

Stop fighting and do your job, grim May tells Tories

■ Embattled PM struggles to enforce party unity, tells Manchester conference MP must shape up for Britain

Theresa May has urged her squabbling party to "shape up" after warring cabinet ministers traded jibes from the platform of the Conservatives' annual conference.

The prime minister closed the gathering in Manchester with a plea for her colleagues to set aside their own ambitions and "do our duty by Britain". She also set out a package of measures to boost council housebuilding and limit domestic bills as she tries to check Labour's electoral momentum since the snap election that robbed the Tories of their Commons majority.

Boris Johnson used his conference speech on Wednesday to intensify attacks on cabinet rivals such as Philip Hammond, the chancellor, who are pushing for a soft Brexit. The foreign secretary vowed to prevent Britain from being left in the "dingy anteroom of the EU, pathetically waiting for the scraps but no longer in control of the menu".

Mr Johnson was attacked in return by cabinet colleagues. Sir Michael Fallon, the defence secretary, and Priti Patel, the international

development secretary, used their speeches to take swipes at his ambitions. David Davis, the Brexit secretary, said that Britain trained the best diplomats in the world then "put them to the test by sending them to work for the foreign secretary".

'stirred up'

Mr Johnson's deputy at the Foreign Office, meanwhile, questioned the legitimacy of the vote to leave the EU last year, blaming it on a "tantrum" by Labour's working-class supporters. Speaking at a think tank event in Chicago on Monday, Sir Alan Duncan said that "traditional blue-collar urban Labour" supporters had been "stirred up" on the issue of immigration by the Leave campaign led by his present boss.

Asked why Boston in Lincolnshire voted heavily for Brexit when it relied on Polish labour for its agriculture, Sir Alan said: "That is one of the paradoxes. Lincolnshire folk said, 'Ooh, they are coming to pinch our jobs'. Well, they would not do the jobs themselves so it was a rather artificial anger."

Behind the scenes at the conference, splits over Britain's future relationship with the EU and the length and nature of any transition raged on during a four-day gathering that has advertised and amplified the deep divisions within cabinet.

Mrs May issued a frank warning to her party that it must either unify or face the wrath of voters.

"Let us shape up and give the country the government it needs," she said. "Beyond this hall, beyond the gossip pages of the newspapers, and beyond the streets, corridors and meeting rooms of Westminster, life continues - the daily lives of ordinary working people go on."

'miserable'

In a message that will be taken as a rebuke to Mr Johnson for sabotaging a conference that was intended to focus on domestic policy rather than Brexit, she told her party to concentrate on everyday concerns, not political ambition, "not worrying about our job security, but theirs; not addressing our concerns,

but the issues, the problems, the challenges, that concern them; not focusing on our future, but on the future of their children and their grandchildren".

The prime minister, who had to deny on Wednesday that she was 'miserable', insisted she has the resilience to carry on. "It has never been

my style to hide from a challenge," she will say. "It is when tested the most that we reach deep within ourselves and find that our capacity to rise to the challenge before us may well be limitless."

Jacob Rees-Mogg, the backbench MP who has emerged as a favourite to take over the party among activists, mocked efforts

to use the conference to show a united front. "It has become like an American presidential convention where we just expect people to turn up and cheer the great and the good. Perhaps not even American but Kim Jong-un style — if you don't clap for long enough you'll get in real trouble," he told a fringe event.

Libya hits back at Johnson's 'cruel' dead bodies remark

Libyans have reacted with anger at comments from Boris Johnson about "dead bodies" standing in the way of one of their cities becoming the next Dubai.

Salah Subhi, an influential member of the Benghazi parliament, warned that Britain could lose out on investment opportunities if the foreign secretary remained in his job. He called the remarks "cruel and unacceptable" and

questioned whether Mr Johnson spoke for his government.

"Is this a reflection of the British government's current views on Libya? Because this is not the UK that I know," said Mr Suhbi, who once held a high position at the British Council in Tripoli.

The foreign secretary told a fringe event at the Conservative Party conference on Tuesday night that British investors wanted to transform Sirte

into "the next Dubai" after a bloody battle to drive out Islamic State.

"The only thing they've got to do is clear the dead bodies away," he said with a chuckle. There were gasps and laughter in the audience before the event's host, Baroness Stroud, steered him off the subject.

A Libyan government spokesman said that the authorities had not heard of the British businessmen **cont. on page 3, col. 1**

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Camilla seduced Charles to get revenge on philandering husband, claims biographer

The Duchess of Cornwall only chose to sleep with Prince Charles in the 1970s as an act of revenge on her boyfriend who was sleeping with the prince's sister, her biographer claimed this week.

Penny Junor said that in 1971 Camilla Shand, as she was then, was so fed up with the philandering of her boyfriend and future husband Andrew Parker Bowles that she got her own back.

She said that when she was introduced to the Prince of Wales by their mutual friend Lucia Santa Cruz, Mr Parker Bowles was "off with Princess Anne".

"So when she was introduced to Charles he thought she was pretty special and he thought she was a bit of all right," Ms Junor told the Henley

Literary Festival on Tuesday.

"And she thought 'Andrew is at the moment off with Princess Anne, I'll teach him a lesson' so she had a fling with Charles."

'he was a cad'

Ms Junor, who acknowledged that she had help from the Duchess of Cornwall's friends to write her biography, said that Camilla had been "passionately" in love with Mr Parker Bowles and generally put up with his behaviour, which continued after their marriage in 1973.

"He was a cad, he was bonking other people, some of her friends," Ms Junor said. "There was a lovely story when she was walking through London in the evening and spotted his car parked outside

the flat of a very good friend of hers. So she let the tyres down and wrote a rude message on the windscreen."

The revelations shed light on the convoluted love life of the heir to the throne and his now-wife in their younger years.

Ms Junor said her research had been revelatory about "how the upper classes bonk".

She said she had discovered that Prince Charles had a series of affairs in his 20s and 30s, often with married women. She said she would only identify one of them — Dale, or Lady Tryon, who he nicknamed Kanga.

Ms Junor writes in *The Duchess: The Untold Story* that she was married to one of the prince's oldest friends, Anthony, later the 3rd Baron Tryon, but when

the "Bonny Prince . . . was on his way to see her, she cleared the house".

Ms Junor, 67, who has also written biographies of Prince Charles and Princess Diana, said that the Prince

was "heartbroken" when Mr Parker Bowles.

They carried on seeing each other, Ms Junor said, until his engagement to Diana. Ms Junor said the

duchess then avoided events where the prince was to be present and said Diana's suggestion that Camilla had slept with the prince on the eve of his wedding was nonsense.

who intended to invest in Sirte and that Mr Johnson had not discussed the matter during his two trips to Libya this year.

Damian Green, the de facto deputy prime minister, said that the foreign secretary's remarks were unacceptable, and two Tory MPs have urged Theresa May to sack him.

When asked about the comments in an interview with Sky News this morning, Mr Green said that all ministers needed to be "careful with their language". The first secretary of state later told the BBC: "Let me be clear: it was not an acceptable use of . . . it was not a sensitive use of language."

Jeremy Hunt, the health secretary, called Mr Johnson's remark "very unfortunate".

"I don't want to defend that," he told the BBC.

The Tory backbenchers Heidi Allen and Anna

Soubry called for Mr Johnson to be sacked. Ms Allen said on Twitter that the comments were "100 per cent unacceptable from anyone, let alone foreign sec. Boris must be sacked for this. He does not represent my party."

A third MP, Sarah Wollaston, called the remarks "crass, poorly judged, grossly insensitive and this is from the person who is representing us on the world stage." She called on him to consider his position.

Mr Johnson defended his remarks, tweeting: "Shame people with no knowledge or understanding of Libya want to play politics with the appallingly dangerous reality in Sirte."

"The reality there is that the clearing of corpses of Daesh [Isis] fighters has been made much more difficult by IEDs and booby traps. That's why Britain is playing a key role in reconstruction and why I have visited Libya twice this year in support."

Libya's UN-backed

unity government confirmed there were bodies of Islamic State militants still trapped in Sirte.

"We estimate between 50 and 150 bodies are still trapped under the rubble in the wreckage of buildings that have been hit by airstrikes. We believe them to be the bodies of Isis and their relatives who stayed to support them, though we offered safe corridors for people to leave," a government spokesman said.

"We cannot clear the bodies because we lack the resources like bulldozers and tractors and because Isis rigged a lot of these areas with IEDs. We fear the remaining bodies will spread disease."

Emily Thornberry, Labour's shadow foreign secretary, said: "For Boris Johnson to treat those deaths as a joke — a mere inconvenience before UK business people can turn the city into a beach resort — is unbelievably crass, callous and cruel."

News in Brief

Decriminalising abortion

The ruling council of the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists (RCOG) has called for abortion to be decriminalised. In England and Wales, a woman who has an abortion without the approval of two doctors (perhaps by buying abortion pills) is committing a criminal offence under the Offences Against the

Person Act 1861, which carries a life term. The council's position now is that abortion "should be treated as a medical, rather than a criminal, issue", for women and their doctors.

New bike laws

The Government has launched a review into whether new laws are needed to tackle dangerous cycling. The review will consider in particular whether there should be an offence equivalent to causing death by

dangerous driving. The announcement follows the case of Charlie Alliston, who knocked over and killed a pedestrian — Kim Briggs — in London last year, while riding a fixed-gear bike with no front brake. Having been cleared of manslaughter, he was found guilty instead of the archaic crime of "wanton or furious driving", and jailed for 18 months. Of the 400 pedestrians typically killed on UK roads each year, one or two are struck by bikes.

Aung San Suu Kyi to be stripped of Oxford gong

Aung San Suu Kyi is to be stripped of the Freedom of the City of Oxford, where she studied as an undergraduate, over her response to the Rohingya crisis.

Oxford city council voted unanimously to support a cross-party motion that said it was "no longer appropriate" to celebrate the de facto leader of Myanmar. The council is to hold a special meeting to confirm the honour's removal on 27 November.

The council leader, Bob Price, supported the motion, reportedly calling it an "unprecedented step" for the local authority.

In recent months, Aung San Suu Kyi has drawn increasing criticism for her apparent defence of Myanmar's treatment of its Rohingya minority, described by the UN as a "textbook example of ethnic cleansing".

Oxford council bestowed the freedom of the city on her in 1997, when she was being held as a political prisoner by Myanmar's military junta.

The decision to remove the award comes after the Oxford college where Aung San Suu Kyi studied recently removed her portrait from public display.

The governing body of

St Hugh's college decided to remove the painting of the Nobel laureate from its main entrance.

A number of British institutions say they are reviewing or removing honours bestowed on Aung San Suu Kyi during her campaign for democracy.

Unison, the UK's second largest trade union, announced last month that it would suspend Aung San Suu Kyi's honorary membership and urged her to do more to denounce the plight of the Rohingya people.

Bristol University, one of a string of universities that awarded honorary degrees to the Burmese leader during her time in opposition, also said it was reviewing its award in light of accusations of brutal mistreatment of the Rohingya.

The London School of Economics student union said it would be stripping Aung San Suu Kyi of her honorary presidency.

As a leader of Myanmar's opposition, Aung San Suu Kyi won international praise and a Nobel peace prize in 1991. Despite being barred from running for president, she won a decisive victory in the country's 2015 election, and was eventually given the title of state counsellor.

Faithless Army husband 'tampered with parachute' to kill wife, court hears

An Army sergeant tried to kill his wife by removing parts of her parachute, causing her to spin thousands of feet to the ground, a court has heard.

Emile Cilliers, 37, is accused of two counts of attempted murder of his former wife, Victoria Cilliers who survived the jump on 5 April 2015.

Winchester Crown Court heard Ms Cilliers suffered multiple injuries.

Mr Cilliers, who denies all charges, wanted to leave his wife for a lover he had met on Tinder, prosecutors said.

It is also claimed that just days before the jump, on 29 March 2015, the defendant tried to kill Ms Cilliers, 40, by deliberately causing a gas leak in the family home while he stayed away.

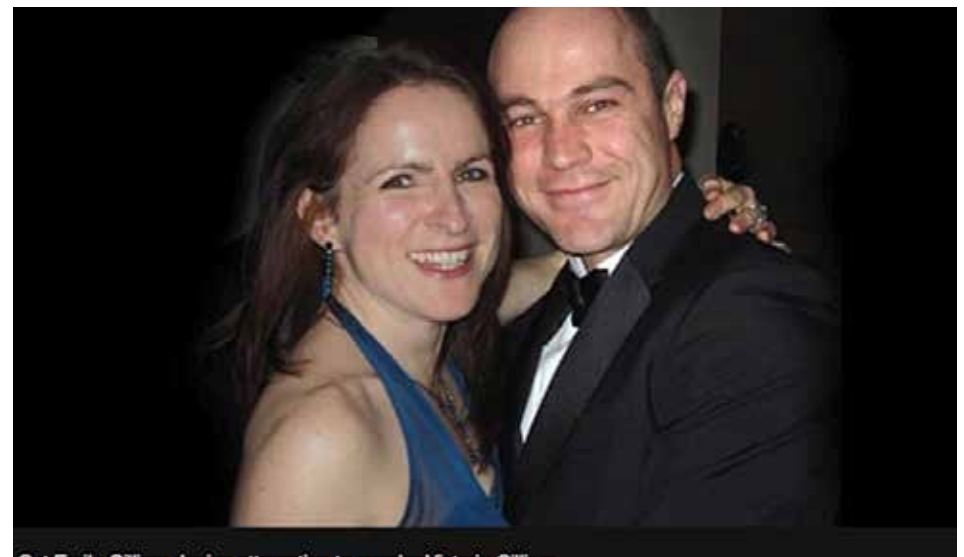
The jury was told the Royal Army Physical Training Corps officer lied to his lover, Stefanie Glover, that he was leaving his Army officer wife because she was having an affair and he was not the father of one of their children.

Mr Cilliers, was also having an affair with his ex-wife, Carly Cilliers, the court heard.

Prosecutor Michael Bowes QC said Mr Cilliers, who was based at Aldershot, Hampshire, had debts of £22,000 and believed he would receive a £120,000 life insurance payout on his wife's death.

Mr Bowes QC, said Victoria Cilliers was a highly experienced parachutist and instructor but when she jumped out of the plane 4,000ft (1,200m) above Netheravon Airfield in Wiltshire "both her main parachute and her reserve parachute failed".

"Those attending at the scene expected to find her dead, although she was badly injured, almost miraculously she

survived the fall.

"Those at the scene immediately realised that something was seriously wrong with her reserve parachute, two vital pieces of equipment which fasten the parachute harness were missing," he said.

He added that at the time

of the murder attempts, Mr Cilliers was leaving his wife and treated her with "callousness and contempt".

Mr Bowes told the jury that within hours of the failed attempt to gas his wife at home and "despite his complete disinterest"

in her "he suggested that she might like to go parachuting the following weekend".

The third allegation, which the 37-year-old also denies, is damaging a gas fitting, reckless to endangerment of life.

The trial continues.



A POLISH FIGHTER PILOT who took part in the Battle of Britain has become the runaway winner of the RAF Museum's poll "The People's Spitfire Pilot", thanks largely to the support of his countrymen both in the UK and in Poland. Franciszek Kornicki (pictured above), who lives in a care home in West Sussex, and recently celebrated his 100th birthday, received 325,000 votes – nearly 320,000 more than Douglas Bader, who came second with 6,300.

Born in Wereszyn, Mr Kornicki joined the Polish Air Force academy as a cadet. Following the Nazi invasion of Poland, he was determined – like many of his comrades – to carry on the resistance elsewhere. Having first fought in France, he arrived in Britain in 1940, where he joined 303 squadron – one of 16 Polish squadrons that were attached to the RAF. In 1943, aged just 26, he took command of 308 squadron. After the War, he married a British woman, and served as an RAF officer for more than 20 years. He described himself as "surprised and a little bewildered" by his success in the poll. "I was just one of many and there were far more distinguished pilots than me flying," he said.

Scottish restaurant tones down the menu – because keeping its Michelin Star is ‘too much trouble’

An award-winning Michelin star restaurant has said it is impossible for it to meet the guide's exacting standards and still make a profit.

Boath House, which has held a Michelin star for the past 10 years, said the guide's expectations are simply "at odds with achievable profit margins".

It has now taken the decision to revert to a more informal style of dining, saying the cost of trying to produce Michelin star cooking is simply too high and too stressful.

Boath House's owners, Don and Wendy Matheson accept it may cost them their star, but say that as well as being less stressful and expensive to maintain it is what modern customers want.

The move follows a request by the celebrated French chef Sebastien Bras for his restaurant to be dropped from the guide.

M. Bras said he dreaded knowing Michelin testers could appear at any time and that the task of meeting their standards was putting him under "huge pressure".

Now Mr and Mrs Matheson - who have run the Boath House, near Nairn, in the Scottish

Highlands, for 20 years - say they are giving up the traditional six course fine dining experience associated with Michelin in favour of more a more relaxed cuisine.

Mrs Matheson said: "We've found our customers want something more informal, rather than a six course fine dining experience and that's what we're now doing. The Michelin guide will have to reassess us on that basis at some time and it may result in the loss of our stars."

"Then again they may like what we do and decide we should retain the star, which would of course be very nice."

She said the economics of running a restaurant to Michelin standards had meant their establishment had run at a loss for years and they were only able to stay in business because of the revenue from Boath House's guest rooms.

"With Michelin dining you might need one chef spending his entire day preparing a single dish. You need incredibly attentive service and certain types of ingredients," she said. "All this is very expensive to maintain and puts an enormous stress on a small family-run business like ours."

Under the continued guidance of its head

chef Charles Lackley, the restaurant will now offer a simpler, three-course menu, with a choice of three starters, three mains and three desserts, based largely on local ingredients such as Scottish venison, west coast seafood, organic cheeses and vegetables and wild mushrooms.

"We're diversifying and simplifying," said Mrs Matheson, who moved from Berkshire to Scotland before buying and restoring Boath House 25 years ago. "Hopefully this will enable us to relax a bit. It's very stressful trying to achieve a Michelin star."

The current edition of the guide states that



A dressing down from Bananarama

EIGHTIES pop queens Bananarama take a dim view of modern pop stars who leave little to the imagination in skimpy stage outfits.

Rebecca Burr, the editor of the Michelin Guide Great Britain and Ireland,

said: "It's obviously up to individual restaurants how they want to run their businesses, and there is absolutely no formula for winning or retaining a Michelin star."

"There has certainly been a trend towards more informal dining over the past 10 years or so, and in fact Michelin has been at the absolute forefront of recognising and celebrating that."

New 'critical line' of inquiry in hunt for Maddie

POLICE searching for Madeleine McCann are investigating a new "person of significance", it emerged this week.

News of the unnamed suspect came to light days after it was revealed that police are to get another £154,000 to fund four officers for six months. It is now understood that officers involved in Operation Grange - Scotland Yard's six-year £11.2million search for Madeleine - are pursuing a "critical line of inquiry".

A source close to the search said officers are

hopeful that the new approach could finally help them get to the bottom of the mystery.

Madeleine's parents, Kate and Gerry McCann, are understood to have been informed of the development, though police declined to comment on the investigation. The source said of the individual being investigated: "It is as much to rule the person out of the inquiry as anything else."

Officers have so far investigated 60 persons of interest and 560 lines of

enquiry. The team, led by Detective Chief Inspector Nicola Wall, insisted there was "still important work to do and focused lines of investigation".

A spokesman added: "The inquiry has not reached a conclusion. We are continuing with determination."

new leads

Operation Grange has reportedly conducted no formal interviews with the McCanns or the seven friends they dined with on the night their daughter disappeared. It is understood that police have been relying on Portuguese transcripts of key interviews with UK witnesses. But former Met detective chief inspector

Colin Sutton suggested this might now change. "I would conduct fresh interviews with all the key British witnesses," he said. "We're talking about interviews given by the McCanns and friends through an interpreter, written down in Portuguese and then translated back into English, so officers from Grange can read them."

"The room for error would be enormous."

Madeleine, three, vanished in Portugal in 2007, while she was on holiday with her family.

It was just last week that the Home Office announced that four detectives on the case have been given six months to find new leads or the probe could be shelved. Following the announcement, Mr and Mrs McCann, who had feared that the search could be axed, said they were "extremely thankful to the Home Office and Scotland Yard".

Experts said the announcement could suggest there was a development that had not been disclosed.

Those limiting beliefs - and how to overcome them

IT'S a hoary cliché that the mind is the most powerful part of the body, which is great when applied for our own highest good, but it can also be destructive, depending on our beliefs and how we apply them to our everyday lives.

We all believe in something things - ranging from Father Christmas as children to a god, religion or philosophy as we reach adulthood. And our beliefs shape our decisions on a daily basis.

But there are also other beliefs - around relationships, friends, food and our lifestyles that don't always work for us. But until we become aware of them and how they are affecting our lives, we can never change them... or improve the quality of our lives.

In today's blog we are looking at three - our beliefs around ourselves,

our food choices and fitness levels.

1. Self Beliefs

What do you believe about yourself? Do you believe you can achieve anything in your life or believe you have limited capacity and opportunity? Maybe you believe "money does not grow on trees" or that "kids should be seen and not heard". Some of these are beliefs have been passed down from our parents, maybe from their grandparents.... and may not even be true! But we still believe them because it's "all we know" and learnt behavior. These self beliefs, if not uncovered and attended to, can have daily consequences on your life and the decisions you make - on a moment to moment basis.

2. Food Beliefs

Do you believe that food

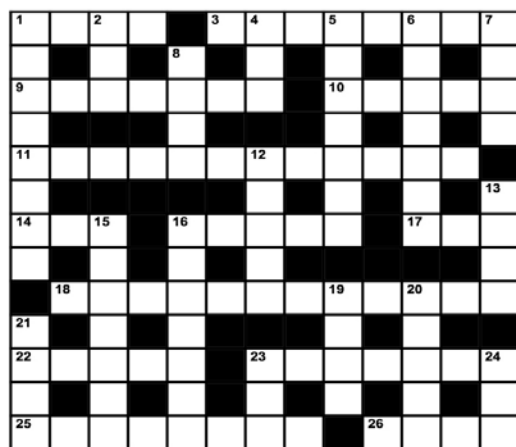
hoping to raise a few hundred pounds for their retirement.

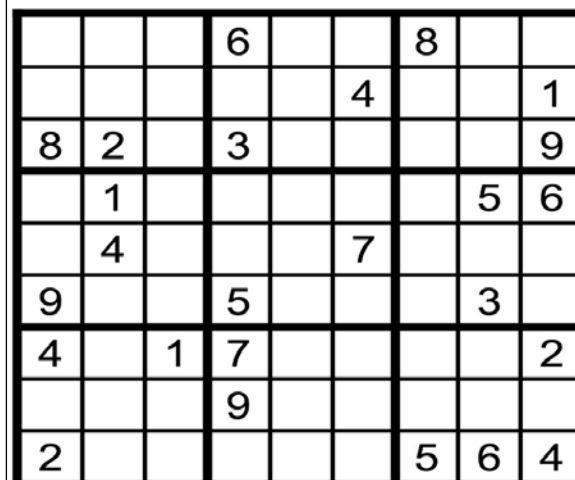

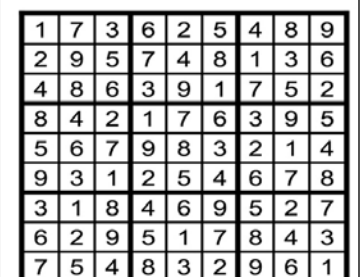

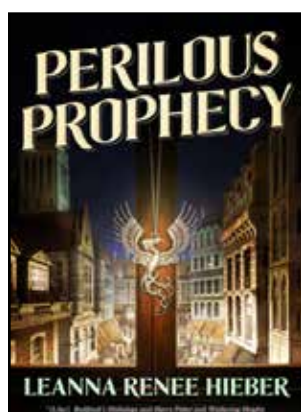
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Perilous Prophecy: gaslamp fantasy in Cairo

Exclusive interview with author Leanna Renee Hieber discussing her rebooted fantasy novel



"This particular book is one that really comes from the depths of my soul," says *Perilous Prophecy* author Leanna Renee Hieber.

"The Victorian setting for the first two *Strangely Beautiful* books has a vast backstory. What happens in the first books is a culmination of a divine legacy. I wanted to show that legacy, its sacrifices, its complications, from a divine and a mortal perspective."

An ancient prophesy predicts a great battle.

Set in 1860s Cairo, we see the Egyptian capital as a vibrant mix of races and religions. Spirits and an evil ghost rise to roam the city. Six young men and women from different cultures, backgrounds, and faiths, all with developing superpowers, form The Guard. Their leader, British-born Beatrice, has doubts. Only eighteen, she's bookish and has been sheltered. All the guard need to learn to master their powers. Another guard, Ibrahim, is strong willed. Why is he not the leader?

A prequel to Hieber's gaslamp fantasy series *Strangely Beautiful*, originally published ten years ago, it's been edited and revised for publication by Tor Books.

"I loved the idea of a divinity just as bound by unpredictable circumstances as the mortals she guides," says

Hieber. "Having this book be an inter-faith book was also very important to me, as loving faiths of every kind are a source of great joy and inspiration to me. I was delighted that little seeds I planted in the first two books really grew and flourished in this book, beauty and divinity in some of the smallest details. Out of all my books, *Strangely Beautiful* had been with me the longest in terms of germination, revision, and world-building."

"Every book I write is a learning experience," says Hieber. "The chance to rewrite this book was particularly instructive... seeing where I could grow as a writer with years of experience between the first edition and this revised volume."

Hieber does extensive research when writing.

"I consumed general history books about

Cairo and relied on my ever-growing personal Victorian era reference library," says Hieber. "It's easy to get lost in the research process, so I had to be very specific about what I was looking for. I focused on what the story needed first, and researched what was pertinent in Cairo and then in London. I've been to London many times for research purposes. My favorite research room in the world is the New York Public Library's map room, an incredible resource, and maps of various periods are like Rosetta Stones to a region and its timelines."

"The Gutenberg Project is really invaluable for historic texts," says Hieber. "I was able to pull up many 19th century books about Cairo. But, I had to unpack the often racist and unhelpfully stereotypical language of English tour books of the era. It's important to

understand bias in any source, especially cross-culturally."

Perilous Prophecy is a winner of the Prism Award for Best Fantasy Novel. This prequel is the third book in her *Strangely Beautiful* saga, and some of the characters make appearances in her other series. "All my worlds are parallel worlds," says Hieber. "So characters cross over from one to the next even though each is an independent series and storyline."

Hieber is a four-time Prism Award winner for excellence in the fantasy romance category. She is currently working on *Miss Violet* and the *Great War*, the final *Strangely Beautiful* novel. Next for her is *The Ghost Precinct*, a new series centering a group of mediums and ghosts working for the New York Police Department in 1899.

Skrtel howler keeps Scottish hopes alive

Scotland kept their World Cup qualifying hopes alive in dramatic fashion as a late Martin Skrtel own goal gave them victory over 10-man Slovakia on Thursday.

It had looked as though the hosts would be denied a potentially decisive win by a combination of the woodwork and goalkeeper Martin Dubravka.

Leigh Griffiths and Chris Martin hit the crossbar, and Dubravka made an outstanding save from Christophe Berra and also kept out Griffiths and James Morrison.

But Skrtel turned home Ikechi Anya's right-wing cross to give Gordon Strachan's side a win that moved them up to second in Group F.

While a draw would not have ended their hopes, the fact Slovakia finish their campaign against Malta - who have taken just a point from nine matches - meant they would have been all but out.

But victory over Slovenia on Sunday will

now secure Scotland second place, and the chance of reaching the play-offs.

The Scots started the game brightly and, playing at high intensity, took the game to their opponents.

Their rhythm was disrupted, though, when Slovakia midfielder Robert Mak was shown a second yellow card, after diving in the penalty area.

Mak had already been a significant figure, his block on Kieran Tierney inside the area judged not to be a penalty by referee Milorad Mazic.

Some games of this magnitude take a while to get going as an occasion. This was not one. Inside 10 minutes, Hampden was howling for a penalty when the doomed Mak collided with Tierney, the Celtic defender going down against a deafening backdrop of the Tartan Army in high dudgeon.

Mazic was having none of it, but when the next major call was demanded of him he was emphatic. Mak had been booked for a lunge on James Forrest in the 17th minute, then

he was given a second yellow for attempting to con Mazic into thinking Craig Gordon had brought him down in the penalty area. He had not. Mak, who scored twice against Scotland last year, deservedly, but reluctantly, walked.

Scotland pressed and harried Slovakia for much of that first half. The visitors were ragged in possession, a shadow of the slick side that dismantled the Scots a year ago. Strachan's team had mountains of possession. Their chances were limited, but the ones they created were good ones.

The first of them came when Berra came steaming in to thunder down a header that was seemingly goalbound, only for Dubravka to make a magnificent diving save. Then, just after half an hour, a curling shot from Griffiths brought another fine intervention from the Slovakia goalkeeper.

Scotland were dominant, but goalless. The longer it stayed locked in stalemate, the more tense it grew.

They came again. A Griffiths shot from



Slovakia midfielder Robert Mak escaped conceding a penalty early on, but was soon sent off for two bookings

outside the box moved slightly in the air but, still, Dubravka, managed to beat it away. Martin then curled a gorgeous shot up and over Dubravka, and here began the cruelty for Scotland. Martin's shot came slapping off the crossbar. Five minutes later, Griffiths stood over

a free-kick and produced another beauty from his dead-ball repertoire. Like Martin's shot, Dubravka was a beaten man. Like Martin's shot again, it came back off the woodwork.

Needing a goal, Strachan brought on James McArthur for

the bandaged Darren Fletcher. Griffiths did wonderfully to win possession and set Anya away down the right. Anya drove his cross low to where Martin and Skrtel were running. The two Martins slid in, but only one of them came up smiling.

Germany irresistible in Belfast

Defending champions Germany confirmed their qualification for next year's World Cup in Russia by beating Northern Ireland 3-1 in Belfast Thursday night.

Sebastian Rudy shot into the top corner in the second minute, Sandro Wagner rifled home from the edge of the area, and Joshua Kimmich drove in late on.

Josh Magennis headed Northern Ireland's goal in stoppage time.

Germany progress as group winners but Northern Ireland remain well placed to make November's play-offs.

Michael O'Neill's men complete their Group C campaign in Norway on Sunday, aiming to finish among the best eight of the nine group runners-up.

They will follow results elsewhere over the next two days but, as it stands, they may need a point in Oslo to make sure of reaching the play-

offs, the draw for which takes place on 17 October.

Of the eight teams, the highest four in the Fifa rankings which will be published on 16 October - Northern Ireland are currently 20th - will be seeded for the play-offs.

Having won five successive qualifying games, Northern Ireland's defeat was their first in a competitive home match since they lost 4-2 to Portugal in September 2013.

In O'Neill's 50th game in charge, they failed to equal their record of six clean sheets in a row - set in 1986, the last time Northern Ireland qualified for the World

Cup. O'Neill's side are hoping to become the first NI team to compete in consecutive major tournaments.

Germany go into their final group game at home to Azerbaijan on Sunday, having extended their unbeaten run to 18 games since losing 2-0 to France in the semi-finals of Euro 2016.

The world champions retain their record of having never lost an away World Cup qualifying game, a run that spans 47 games from March 1934, and they have only ever lost two World Cup qualifier fixtures.

Martin O'Neill has agreed a contract extension which will keep him in charge of the Republic of Ireland for the Euro 2020 campaign.

The 65-year-old former Aston Villa boss succeeded Giovanni Trapattoni as manager of the Republic in November 2013.

Assistant manager Roy Keane has also extended his deal with the FAI.

"I think there are exciting times ahead for us with some younger players coming through," said O'Neill.

"I wasn't sure I would get used to international football, but qualification for the Euros made it all worthwhile."

Kane seals World Cup spot

Harry Kane's injury-time winner secured England's qualification for next summer's World Cup with victory against Slovenia Thursday night - but this was a display designed to dampen any sense of expectation.

Kane, England captain for the night, bundled in Kyle Walker's cross for his 11th goal in 22 international appearances to finally break down Slovenia's resistance as they looked likely to hold out for a point.

It meant manager Gareth Southgate can now start planning in earnest for Russia but could not cover up the cracks in an England performance that was lifeless, uninspired and mediocre.

Marcus Rashford and Raheem Sterling almost broke the deadlock before Kane made his breakthrough, the hosts were also grateful to much-criticised keeper Joe Hart for some crucial

interventions.

England and Southgate have achieved their goal. It was not, however, achieved in a manner that will start alarm bells ringing for any future World Cup opposition.

Elsewhere in the group, Scotland kept their qualifying hopes alive in dramatic fashion as a late Martin Skrtel own goal gave them victory over 10-man Slovakia at Hampden Park.

England's qualification for Russia was confirmed by that late strike from Kane but Wembley was hardly awash with joyous scenes at the final whistle.

And that was because, for the large part, this was a desperately poor England performance as they struggled to find a way through a well-drilled Slovenia.

England's poor performance drew mockery and sarcasm

from some sections of a dissatisfied Wembley crowd, clearly unimpressed by what they were witnessing.

Southgate said he was aware of the crowd's discontent and the unhappy mood of England's supporters meant there was an absence of the air of celebration that normally accompanies World Cup qualification.

It was also an atmosphere tempered by the reality of England's current standing apart from the elite of the international game.

England carry a forward threat in the shape of Kane and

Rashford, who will be supplemented by Dele Alli when he is free

from suspension, but the glaring lack of creativity elsewhere - especially in

central midfield - must represent a real concern for Southgate.
