THEY'RE COMING FOR OUR CHOCCY!

■ Lawsuit from candy giant may put an end to US sales of popular British sweets

IN A VERY worrying development for British expats with a sweet tooth and countless small British businesses, Hershey Corporation has launched a lawsuit against leading importers of British confectionery which, if successful, could make it impossible to buy British Maltesers, Kit Kats, Yorkies and other favorites at your local import store.

In what has the makings of a classic David vs Goliath battle, the deep-pocketed candy giant has trained its legal guns on the two major importers of British sweets, LA-based LLB Imports and New Jersey's Posh-Nosh Imports.

'confusion'

The lawsuit stands on two key issues, specifically that the packaging of certain imported candies so closely resemble Hershey's products as to cause 'confusion' in the mind of consumers, and that other imported British chocolate products - including

Yorkie, Maltesers, Kit Kat and Rolo - infringe on Hershey trademarks. These brands are made and sold by Nestlé and other companies outside the U.S., but Hershey has the exclusive right to sell products under these brand names in the U.S., the suit says. In the case of Yorkie, Hershey says the name infringes on its license to sell York peppermint patties in the U.S.

According to the wording of the lawsuit, LBB's sale of the imported candy "is likely to cause confusion ... and to deceive the public as to the approval, sponsorship, license, source or origin"

of the products. The suit claims, for example, that consumers could confuse the popular British treat Toffee Crisp for Reese's Peanut Butter Cups, (which have annual U.S. sales of more than \$1 billion), because "both have the same orange background color and both feature a slanting, yellow font with brown outlining."

According to the suit, Hershey - which reported total sales in excess of \$7bn in 2013 - has trademarked the "distinctive" packaging.

"financial disaster"

If Hershey prevail in the case it could spell the end for many small

British-owned import shops across the country for whom confectionery represents a major portion of their sales.

One local British shop owner told the BW this week: "This could mean financial disaster for us, pure and simple. We'd have to close the business."

trip to a local British import store in Santa Monica to conduct some field research - where Hershey's claims prompted derision, incomprehension - and concern.

"I've never heard such nonsense in my life," said Alex Moor, 38. "If we wanted Peanut Butter Cups why would we go to a British store to buy them? You can get them at any 7-11."

'infringing'

Another customer, who preferred not to give her name, told us: "There's no confusion about this chocolate's origin," she said, pointing to a Yorkie bar. "It's because I know where it comes from that I choose to buy it."

Among other claims in the lawsuit, Hershey alleges that LBB "continues to import and sell the infringing products, despite previously admitting that its actions infringed Hershey's trademark rights and repeatedly agreeing to stop its infringing conduct."

According to the lawsuit, lawyers for Hershey first wrote to LBB in December 2012, asking it to stop selling the products. In August 2013, the lawsuit says, Nathan Dulley, president

of LBB, agreed to stop the sales, but LBB has continued selling the candy. A check of the LBB website this week showed all of the products, except Cadbury's, for sale.

anonymity

The lawsuit asks that LBB be stopped from advertising or selling the imported products.

The owner of another leading local British import shop, speaking on condition of anonymity, told the BW: "If they win the suit there will be NO more UK and EU Cadbury products in you local British shops like ours, no Flakes, Crunchies, Buttons, no Curlywurllys and NO Easter Eggs next year. In fact nothing from Cadbury other than Hershey Cadbury and we don't sell that."

We would urge all British Weekly readers and others concerned about this lawsuit to contact Hershey and protest their actions.

Rigby killers' appeal denied

Two men convicted of killing Fusilier Lee Rigby in May 2013 have lost legal challenges against their sentences.

Michael Adebolajo's attempts to have his conviction overturned and whole-life sentence reduced were rejected by three judges at the Court of Appeal on Wednesday.

Michael Adebowale, who was arguing for a reduction in his minimum sentence of 45 years, also had his case thrown out.

Fusilier Rigby's estranged wife Rebecca said: "We are relieved that this is over and justice has been done."

'horrific and barbaric'

She added: "I would like to thank everyone for their continued support over the last 18 months and hope I can now build a future for my son Jack and ensure Lee's memory lives on."

Lord Chief Justice Lord Thomas, sitting with Lady Justice Hallett and Mr Justice Openshaw, said the sentences were "just" punishment for the "horrific and barbaric" murder.

The pair had "gloried" in what they had done, he said.

Adebolajo's attempt to challenge his conviction

was "misconceived" and "completely hopeless", he said.

"They inflicted upon the family of Fusilier Rigby suffering extremely difficult to describe, and something they must live with for the rest of their lives," Lord Thomas added.

'Memory alive'

Adebowale, 23, watched the proceedings via video link from Broadmoor.

Adebolajo, 29, waived his right to do so from Frankland Prison, Country Durham.

Fusilier Rigby was

killed on 22 May last year outside Woolwich barracks in south-east London.

Adebolajo and Adebowale drove into the 25-year-old before hacking him to death.

Fusilier Rigby's fiancée, Aimee West, said she was "relieved" and "thankful" after the hearing.

She added: "I hope that this is the last we will hear from them both, so that I can focus on rebuilding my life and keeping Lee's memory alive."

Last month, a report found Fusilier Rigby's

death could not have been prevented despite his killers appearing in seven intelligence investigations.

The report, by the Intelligence and Security Committee (ISC), revealed Adebowale had expressed his intent to murder a soldier in a "graphic and emotive" manner during an exchange with an overseas extremist in December 2012.

The intelligence agencies did not know about this exchange, understood to have been on Facebook, until after Fusilier Rigby's death.

Scots cut drink-drive alcohol limit



NO MARGIN FOR ERROR: the new limits bring Scotland closer in line with the rest of Europe

A new law has come into force which makes the legal drink-drive limit in Scotland lower than elsewhere in the UK.

The change reduces the legal alcohol limit from 80mg to 50mg in every 100ml of blood.

Campaigners believe the new limit will cut the number of deaths and serious injuries on Scottish roads.

The limit elsewhere in the UK will remain at 80mg - the joint highest in Europe.

Northern Ireland is currently considering making the same reduction as Scotland.

Police and road safety campaigners have said an average of 20 people die on Scotland's roads each year as a result of collisions involving people who were driving while over the legal alcohol limit.

A further 90 were seriously injured and 340 slightly injured as a result of drink-driving related collisions last year.

The amount a motorist can drink before being over the limit depends on

factors including their gender, age, weight, metabolism, stress levels and whether they have eaten recently, as well as the size and strength of the drink.

Experts have said the new 50mg limit, which came into force at midnight on Thursday, means that an average man would be limited to just under a pint of beer or a large glass of wine, and women to half a pint of beer or a small glass of wine.

But an awareness-raising campaign ahead of the change warned that "the best advice is none" - meaning people should not drink any alcohol if they intend to drive.

Motorists have also been reminded it will take longer before they are legally able to drive the morning after drinking alcohol.

For most people, it takes about an hour to process one unit of alcohol - so it could take up to 12 hours to be safe to drive after drinking a bottle of wine.

The Scottish Parliament voted unanimously in favour of the new law, which brings Scotland into line with much of Europe, on 18 November.

The Scottish government has previously said it had sought a joint approach with Westminster but the UK government decided to retain the higher 80mg limit, which is shared elsewhere in Europe by only Malta.

It means that a driver could leave England under the legal alcohol limit but find they are breaking the law once they pass over the border into Scotland.

As well as a media campaign to raise awareness, events have been taking place at Scottish supermarkets, service stations, airports and at key railway stations, such as Edinburgh Waverley and Glasgow Central, to highlight the new limit.

Scotland's Justice Secretary Michael Matheson has predicted the lower limit will save lives.

Mr Matheson said: "Scotland is leading the way across the UK. The new limit has backing from experts, road safety campaigners and the majority of the public north and south of the border.

"This change will bring Scotland into line with most of Europe."

The film is the culmination of director Sir Peter Jackson's The

Jeremy Thorpe dead at 85

■ Former Liberal Party leader dropped out of public life after sensational conspiracy to murder trial

Former Liberal Party leader Jeremy Thorpe, who once stood trial at the Old Bailey for conspiracy to murder, has died.

Mr Thorpe, 85, who headed the party in the 1960s and 1970s, had been suffering from Parkinson's Disease for more than three decades.

He had a glittering political career, helping to revive the Liberals in the 1970s, but was

brought down by the sensational court case in which he was accused of conspiracy and incitement to murder former male model Norman Scott.

After his acquittal in 1979, he withdrew into the privacy of his home and family and effectively cut himself off from public life amid ailing health.

Acquitted with Mr Thorpe were his close

friend David Holmes, then 49, a one-time deputy treasurer of the Liberal Party, and two South Wales businessmen, John Le Mesurier, 49, and George Deakin, 39, a nightclub owner.

Mr Thorpe, who was 50 at the time, was also cleared on the charge he faced alone of incitement to kill.

The man who saw himself as a future prime

minister was to fall victim to the one chink in his armour - a homosexual tendency in his youth.

Through this he became involved, 18 years before the trial, with Mr Scott, a young homosexual who was to turn up again and again through his life, casting a pall over his whole career.

'resolute fighter'

Their lives remained inextricably linked. Mr Scott claimed a

relationship, which Mr Thorpe consistently and vigorously denied.

There was intense interest in the Old Bailey trial, which lasted 31 days, with the jury taking 52 hours to acquit all the accused of everything.

This was after the judge's summing up in which he repeatedly challenged Mr Scott's credibility and denounced him as a crook and "an accomplished sponger, very skilful at exciting and exploiting sympathy".

Those paying tribute to Mr Thorpe included Lord (David) Steel of Aikwood, who succeeded him as party leader, and said: "He had a genuine sympathy for the underprivileged - whether in his beloved North Devon where his first campaign was for 'mains, drains and a little bit of light' or in Africa, where he was a resolute fighter against apartheid and became a respected friend of people like President Kaunda of Zambia."

Liberal Democrat former minister Sir Nick Harvey, who represents Mr Thorpe's former constituency of North Devon, described him as a "towering force in shaping the political landscape of the late 20th

and early 21st centuries".

"Jeremy Thorpe was a colossal figure in the revival of the Liberal cause in post-war Britain and today's Lib Dem politicians continue to feast on his legacy," he said.

'brilliant campaigner'

"His charisma, energy and innovative campaigning lit up his generation of British politics. He was the first to embrace fully the television age, the first to hit the campaign trail in a helicopter and both the first and, rather memorably, the last to deploy a hovercraft."

Former Liberal Democrat leader Sir Menzies Campbell said: "Jeremy Thorpe's enforced resignation as leader of the Liberal Party and his subsequent departure from Parliament should not obscure the fact that in his day he was an outstanding parliamentarian with a coruscating wit, and a brilliant campaigner on the stump whose interest and warmth made him a firm favourite with the public."

He added that Mr Thorpe "bore his long illness with courage and determination". and never lost his "consuming interest" in politics.



Artificial Intelligence could be the death of us, warns Hawking

Prof Stephen Hawking, one of Britain's pre-eminent scientists, has said that efforts to create thinking machines pose a threat to our very existence.

He told the BBC this week: "The development of full artificial intelligence could spell the end of the human race."

His warning came in response to a question about a revamp of the technology he uses to communicate, which involves a basic form of AI.

But others are less gloomy about AI's prospects.

The theoretical physicist, who has the motor neurone disease amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), is using a new system developed by Intel to speak.

Machine learning experts from the British company Swiftkey were also involved in its creation. Their technology, already employed as a smartphone keyboard app, learns how the professor thinks and suggests the words he might want to use next.

Prof Hawking says the primitive forms of

artificial intelligence developed so far have already proved very useful, but he fears the consequences of creating something that can match or surpass humans.

It would take off on its own, and re-design itself at an ever increasing rate," he said.

"Humans, who are limited by slow biological evolution, couldn't compete, and would be superseded."

But others are less pessimistic.

"I believe we will remain in charge of the technology for a decently long time and the potential of it to solve many of the world problems will be realised," said Rollo Carpenter, creator of Cleverbot, a new software which learns from its past conversations, and has gained high scores in the so-called Turing test, fooling a high proportion of people into believing they are talking to a human.

Rise of the robots

Mr Carpenter says we are a long way from having the computing power or developing the algorithms needed to achieve full

artificial intelligence, but believes it will come in the next few decades.

"We cannot quite know what will happen if a machine exceeds our own intelligence, so we can't know if we'll be infinitely helped by it, or ignored by it and sidelined, or conceivably destroyed by it," he says.

But he is betting that AI is going to be a positive force.

Robotic voice

Hawking has, however, been an enthusiastic early adopter of all kinds of communication technologies and is looking forward to being able to write much faster with his new system.

But one aspect of his own tech - his computer generated voice - has not changed in the latest update.

Prof Hawking concedes that it's slightly robotic, but insists he didn't want a more natural voice.

"It has become my trademark, and I wouldn't change it for a more natural voice with a British accent," he said.

"I'm told that children who need a computer voice, want one like mine."

Rugged Prince Harry makes striking cover debut on US mag

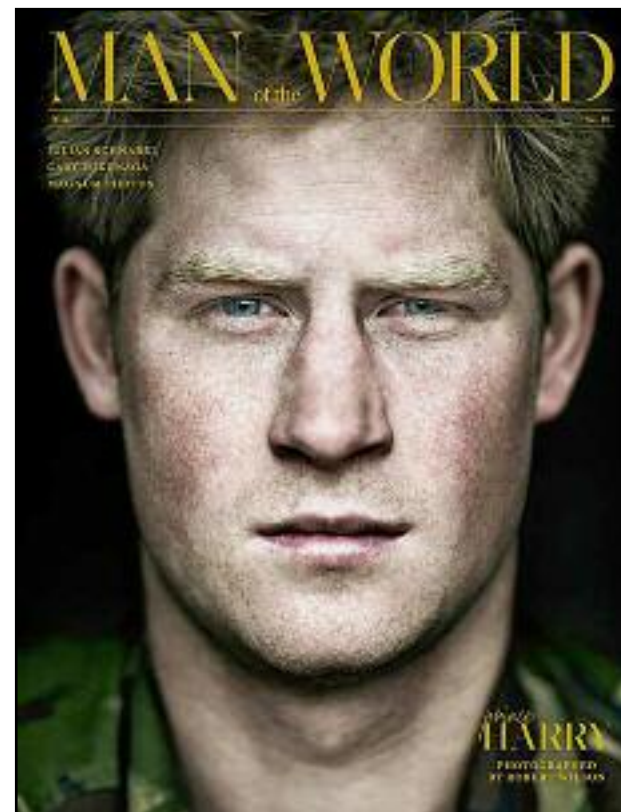
HANDSOME and rather rugged - Prince Harry certainly didn't disappoint when he made his cover debut on a glossy US menswear magazine this week.

■ Villagers blame migrant workers for stealing all their ducks

Posters have been put all around the sleepy village of Earith, in Cambridgeshire, accusing migrant workers after seven ducks went missing.

Villagers are blaming people of "different cultures" for snatching all seven ducks from a village pond for their Christmas dinner.

The resident birds - all Aylesbury-type ducks - had been a familiar sight in sleepy Earith, Cambridgeshire, for years and were quite tame.

A feeding area had recently been built where children could feed them.

But they all disappeared on consecutive nights over

the course of a week, and villagers say some wild ducks and two swans are also missing.

Parish councillor Hazel Lambert, who fed the ducks every day, put up posters around the village warning of the thefts before she found all seven gone.

They said: "Ducks on Earith village pond are being taken and it's not by Mr. Fox. Four ducks have been removed within the last week. Please keep a look out."

Earith lies in a big agricultural area where many migrant workers - predominantly from Eastern Europe - are employed in the fields.

Ms Lambert said: "We had seven old ducks who had been with us for years and were tame resident ducks.

"One night last week one disappeared overnight. Then another went missing, and another, every day until there were none left.

"We had one female duck and the rest are boys, and she had a hobble and was very old.

"We can all have thoughts about who it might be that has stolen the ducks, but I don't want to point the finger.

"All I know is in different cultures the idea of capturing and eating wild fowl is quite normal."

Court finds drinking while pregnant is 'not a crime'



A British court on Thursday ruled that heavy drinking during pregnancy should not be considered a "crime of violence" against the child in a case that had raised concerns about criminalising mothers.

The case was brought by a local authority applying to the government's criminal compensation authority for damages on behalf of a seven-year-old girl in its care who has severe disabilities after her mother drank heavily while pregnant.

"We have held that a mother who is pregnant and who drinks to excess... is not guilty of a criminal offence under our law if her child is subsequently born damaged as a result," the ruling said.

The local authority's lawyers had argued that the mother was "reckless" in her behaviour by drinking up to half a bottle of vodka and eight cans of strong lager a day while she was pregnant.

While they do not suggest the damage was deliberate, they say she discussed her drinking with professionals and "went on to take the risk".

The ruling centred on whether a foetus can be considered a person under English law. The case has sparked heated debate over the dangers of alcohol and the rights of women and foetuses in a country

where abortion has been legal since 1967.

While there was no suggestion of charges against the mother, women's rights groups had warned that it risked opening the door to police action against other pregnant women with alcohol problems.

Ann Furedi, head of the British Pregnancy Advisory Service, and Rebecca Schiller, co-chair of Birthrights, hailed the decision saying: "This is an extremely important ruling for women everywhere.

"The UK's highest courts have recognised that women must be able to make their own decisions about their pregnancies," they said in a joint statement.

The Court of Appeal judgement caps a five-year legal battle between the council and the Criminal Injuries Compensation Authority (CICA).

The CICA considers applications for damages involving behaviour that could constitute a crime, in this case the alleged reckless administration of a noxious substance to the foetus.

The girl, known only as CP, has a severe form of foetal alcohol spectrum disorder (FASD), an umbrella term which covers a range of disorders varying from reduced intellectual ability to heart and kidney problems.

Sixties rocker Ian McLagan dies aged 69 after suffering a stroke

SIXTIES rock star Ian McLagan, who played in the Faces and Small Faces, died this week after suffering a stroke.

The keyboard legend, who was 69, passed away after a battle to save his life at a hospital in his adopted hometown of Austin, Texas.

A statement on his website read: "It is with great sadness and eternal admiration that we report the passing of rock and roll icon Ian McLagan.

"He died today, December 3 2014, surrounded by family and friends in his adopted hometown of Austin, Texas due to complications from a stroke suffered the previous day.

"Ian's artistry, generosity and warmth of spirit touched countless other musicians and music fans around the world. His loss will be felt by so many."

His manager Ken Kushnik paid tribute saying: "He was a beloved friend to so many and a true rock and roll spirit.

"His persona and gift of song impacted the music across oceans and generations."

Former bandmate Kenney Jones said: "I am completely devastated by this shocking news and I know this goes for Ronnie (Wood) and Rod (Stewart) too."

Fellow musician Billy Bragg tweeted: "I have lost a dear friend and British rock has lost one of its greatest players. RIP Ian McLagan"

McLagan, known in the music industry as Mac, rose to fame in 1965 when he joined Steve Marriott, Kenney Jones and Ronnie Lane of the Small Faces.

They recorded hits such as Lazy Sunday, All or Nothing and Itchycoo Park.

After the departure of Steve Marriott, the remaining band members hooked up with Ronnie Wood and Rod Stewart to form the Faces and went on to have success with Had Me a Real Good Time and Stay with Me.

But when Ronnie Lane left the band, it spelled the end for the Faces. Rod Stewart left shortly afterwards to pursue a solo career and then Ronnie Wood joined the Rolling Stones.

McLagan continued to work and perform with big names in the music industry including Chuck Berry, Jackson Browne,

Bob Dylan, Bruce Springsteen and The Rolling Stones and was inducted into the Rock n Roll Hall of Fame in 2012.

He was due to begin a north American tour with singer/songwriter and labelmate Nick Lowe on the day he died.

Cruel teaching assistant bullied girl, 7

A classroom assistant who bullied a seven-year-old girl for five months has been found guilty of child cruelty.

Rachael Regan, 43, taped the pupil to her chair, shut her in a storeroom and tied her shoes on with string.

Bradford Crown Court heard that Regan "singled out" the girl at the school in Calderdale, West Yorkshire.

Her bullying campaign also included sticking Post-it notes to

her thumbs to stop her sucking them, kicking her chair, calling her a nickname, hiding her doll and tearing up a photograph of her.

Regan spent more than a year on bail before being charged and her victim is now nine. Judge Neil Davey QC said the girl had waited "a quarter of her lifetime" to give evidence.

An investigation was launched by the school and the police after the girl told her mother a teacher had tied her to a

chair with sticky tape in front of other pupils.

The woman, who cannot be named, said her daughter "clung" to her "for dear life" and was in tears after it happened.

"(My daughter) just came rushing out and hugged me and tears were just rolling down her face," the woman said.

"It was just so heartbreaking to see her like that because (she) is so bubbly and outgoing and I have never seen my daughter so upset."

'Imitation' is the real thing

■ Compelling storytelling and strong performances make *The Imitation Game* an enthralling movie, writes Debbie Lynn Elias

As you are reading this very column, be it online or in print, one of the people responsible for this luxury is the very man celebrated in *The Imitation Game* - Alan Turing.

Although director Morten Tyldum focuses on Turing's life in the context of WWII and the genius of his mathematical and codebreaking skills, it is thanks to Turing's work for the Allies during this time at Bletchley Park, the Government Code and Cypher School, that an early version of the device we now know as "the computer" was born.

Working from a script by first time scribe Graham Moore, the Norwegian Tyldum (for whom this movie is his English-speaking directorial debut), rivets us with historical and personal intrigue, all brought to life thanks to one of the most masterful performances of the year by Benedict Cumberbatch in the central role of Turing.

Opening in 1952 England, we first meet Turing as he is being investigated and subsequently arrested on charges of "gross indecency." 1952 England meant homosexuality was as much closeted and secreted as Turing's codebreaking in 1939, and to be discovered or caught in the act, meant jail and/or medical castration. Turing's story unfolds as he tells a rapt police detective his entire history (Thus employing the very helpful technique of voice-over narration in

this particular instance.), starting with 1939 shortly after England's entrance into WWII.

At just 27 years of age Turing was already the best of the best. As a mathematician, he was unparalleled, and had been since his early days at boarding school. But the war wasn't going well for Britain or the Allies, who were always one step behind the Nazi war machine thanks to an unbreakable German code known as "Enigma" which encoded all military transmissions, thus constantly hampering British intelligence operations. As for the government's crack team of cryptologists, none had the skill to break Enigma. So it was no wonder that on applying to Bletchley, Turing was immediately put into service.

But Turing's social skills were anything but sociable and if he was being graded for how well he plays with others, that would be his one failing grade. Alienating everyone on his team, but for MI6 agent Stewart Menzies, Turing is relegated to playing second-fiddle to the alpha male of the group, Hugh Alexander. Dissatisfied with the pecking order, Turing appeals directly to Winston Churchill, pleading a case for his superior skills. And Churchill goes for it, putting Turing in charge of the team.

Not just content with being the man in charge and able to focus on his idea of creating a machine that will mathematically break the code, and needing

his own allies within, Turing hires more men - and one woman, Joan Clarke (Keira Knightley). Impressed with Clarke, and a bit perturbed when her problem solving and cryptology skills are far better than even his own, Joan begins to serve another purpose; as buffer between Turing and Alexander, eventually bringing the boys all together to work as one; but for how long and at what potential cost?

With the clock ticking and Allied losses heavy, Turing and company try to keep the military wolves at bay as they move ever closer to making Turing's machine (dubbed "Christopher" after his childhood love) the long dreamed of codebreaker.

Let's just say it now: Benedict Cumberbatch. Oscar nomination please! Like co-stars Mark Strong and Matthew Goode, all three are custom made for cloak-and-dagger roles. Each delivers enigmatic performances that challenge the audience to think and look below the surface for the truth of each real life character portrayed. As intelligence head Stewart Menzies Strong really shines, especially in his cat-and-mouse interactions with Charles Dance's Denniston.

When it comes to chess champion turned codebreaker Hugh Alexander, Goode delivers one of the best performances of his career. He plays Alexander with suspicion, defiance and arrogance, but then

completely shifts tone providing a wonderful emotional arc.

Keira Knightley is the glue in this mix and the tether between the world/society and Alan Turing. Knightley also has some very powerful scenes which she delivers with so much conviction and passion as to almost be frightening.

I admit that I was captivated, absolutely riveted to the story behind cracking Enigma - which I knew a little bit about but nowhere near enough - but to see it play out with such intricacy and intensity, simply enthralling. Tyldum and Moore steep us in history and information. Thanks to meticulous production design, there is very specific attention to the

electrical detail and intricacies of the schematics for "Christopher" and the cloak and dagger nature of the very buildings in which the codebreakers worked and in which "Christopher" was housed", all of which elevated the story to an immersive experience.

Problematic, however, is the final act of the film, most notably the last few minutes. The audience knows way before the "big reveal" that Turing is gay thanks to Cumberbatch's performance, which is imbued with stereotypical shadings of the day that he executes eloquently. However, when the film returns to the 1952 present and the criminal charges for sexual perversion against Turing, title

cards pop on screen taking us out of the historical impact of Turing and Enigma, creating a desire and need to see more about the "hidden" Turing. In those final moments, the historical impact of the film from the standpoint of Enigma and the war feels undermined, and the discussion on homosexuality of the day feels shortchanged.

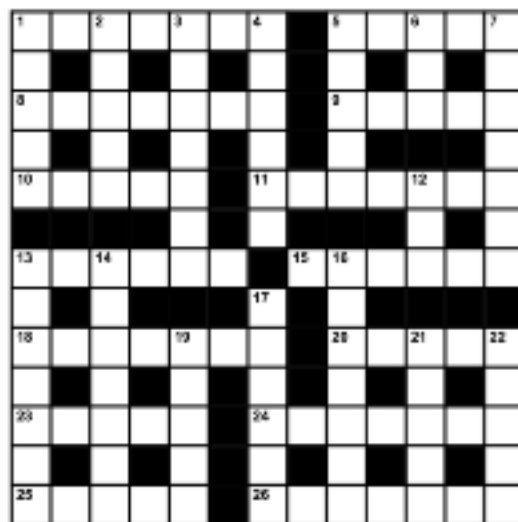

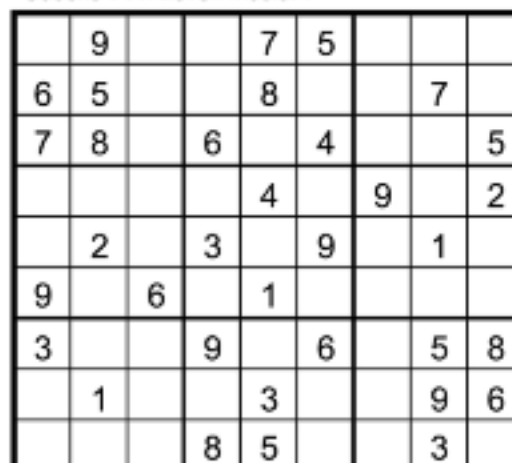

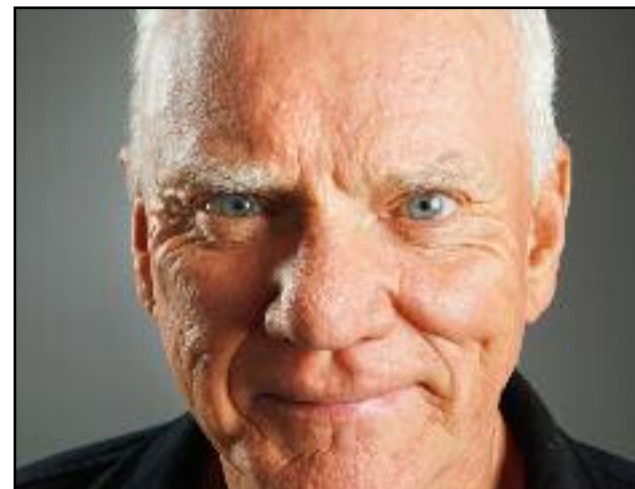

Sanchez impact 'fabulous', says Wenger

No player has settled into the Premier League quicker than Alexis Sanchez, according to Arsenal boss Arsene Wenger.

The Chile forward, who joined from Barcelona in July, scored his ninth top-flight goal of the season in the Gunners's 1-0 win over Southampton in midweek.

"It is difficult to find examples of people who have settled so quickly," said Wenger. "Quicker, you cannot.

"He has such a will to win, which is why he always finds something special."

Sanchez has now scored 14 goals in 22 appearances for the Londoners in all competitions since moving from the Nou Camp for a fee in the region of £35m.

It is the first time the 25-year-old has scored as many as nine goals after 14 league matches in European football, having previously recorded eight in 14 at Barcelona last season.

"When you look at the goals and the impact he has, it is fabulous," said Wenger.

Sanchez's 89th-minute winner secured a third consecutive win on Wednesday for the Gunners, moving them into the Premier League top six and just three points below third-placed Southampton.

It was the Saints's second consecutive defeat in the league but Wenger believes Ronald Koeman's men are realistic top-four contenders.

"Don't bury them too quickly," he said. "They are a good side and they played very well.

"It was a victory of patience and intelligence and we kept our structure well."

Aguero can still improve, says City boss

Manchester City manager Manuel Pellegrini says there is more to come from in-form striker Sergio Aguero.

The 26-year-old Argentine is in scintillating form and took his Premier League and Champions League goal tally for the season to 19 with two in the 4-1 win at Sunderland in midweek.

"Sergio is only 26 and he can improve every day," said Pellegrini.

"At the moment we are seeing very high performances from him. Not only is he scoring but he is playing well as well."

Aguero's haul includes all four in a 4-1 rout of

Tottenham on 18 October and a hat-trick in the 3-2 Champions League win over Bayern Munich on 25 November.

The former Atletico Madrid player equalised with a sublime 16-yard finish after Sunderland had taken the lead through Connor Wickham at the Stadium of Light on Wednesday.

Stevan Jovetic and Pablo Zabaleta also found the net before Aguero completed the rout by sweeping home James Milner's pass.

Aguero is the Premier League's leading scorer with 14, three more than Chelsea's Diego Costa.

But Pellegrini was keen to praise the team effort against Sunderland as City remained six points behind leaders Chelsea after a third straight top-flight win.

"He is an important player but it is not just Sergio Aguero," added the City boss.

"We play in a way that it

is very useful for him to score. But it is important for him not just to think about scoring but to play for the team.

"The team is coming again in their performances and all the players are having more trust in what we are doing, but we must continue the same way."

Aguero's two goals helped City end a run of four successive defeats at the Stadium of Light.

"We were able to lift the curse in a tricky field. The goals? Always the more enjoyable when we win," tweeted Aguero after the game.

Manchester United skipper Wayne Rooney will have a scan on Wednesday to determine the damage to his injured knee, says boss Louis van Gaal.

Rooney, 29, missed Tuesday's 2-1 home win against Stoke

after picking up the problem in the final moments of Saturday's victory against Hull.

"He will have a scan and then we will know more," said Van Gaal. "I hope the injury is not so serious."

He added that there is "more light in the tunnel"

for United's injury list.

United have been hampered by injuries since Van Gaal replaced David Moyes in the summer, with the majority of his first-choice players missing matches at various stages of the season.

Didier Drogba inspired Chelsea to a 3-0 win over Tottenham Wednesday night to maintain the Blues' six-point lead at the top of the table.

Tottenham missed two good chances early on - Harry Kane hitting the bar then dragging a shot wide - and Chelsea went ahead when Eden Hazard finished sweetly following a one-two with Drogba.

The striker, who replaced the suspended Diego Costa, then netted with a low shot following a Hugo Lloris mistake.

Substitute Loic Remy completed the win with a smart finish from 12 yards.

Victory means Chelsea are unbeaten in 23 games in all competitions, equalling a club record.

And there was plenty to admire about the Blues, who once again turned on the style for 10 first-half minutes to blow away their second-best opponents.

Tottenham, who are still without a win at Stamford Bridge since 1990, could not deal with the sublime skill of Hazard, the power and physicality of Drogba and the rampaging runs down the right from full-back Branislav Ivanovic.

Perhaps more pertinently, though, Jose Mourinho's men did it all without leading scorer Costa and, in the second half, minus Gary Cahill who suffered a head injury during an early clash with Jan Vertonghen.

But it might have been so different if Tottenham had taken their early chances.

Vertonghen had already

headed over the bar when Kane rattled the woodwork with a header from Aaron Lennon's right-wing cross.

Moments later, the forward picked up on Cahill's mistake, drove forward into the box but took one touch too many and flashed his angled shot across the face of goal.

Those misses proved costly when Chelsea stunned the visitors with a quick one-two which all but killed the game as a contest.

First, Hazard rifled a left-footed shot beyond Lloris after being played in by Drogba.

Then, three minutes later, Lloris directed a goal-kick straight to Hazard. He passed to Oscar, who in turn fed Drogba and the Ivorian striker hammered the ball past the French keeper.

Chelsea completely bossed the second half - Cesc Fabregas pulling the strings - and it was no surprise when Remy made it three by getting goal-side of Vertonghen, who had a night to forget, before cutting inside and placing a shot beyond Lloris.

Spurs registered only their second effort on target in injury time, but Thibaut Courtois was not to be denied a fourth consecutive clean sheet as he acrobatically saved Nacer Chadli's shot.

Chelsea manager Jose Mourinho: "We played against a very good team and they showed that during some periods in the game.

"They started better than us and should have
